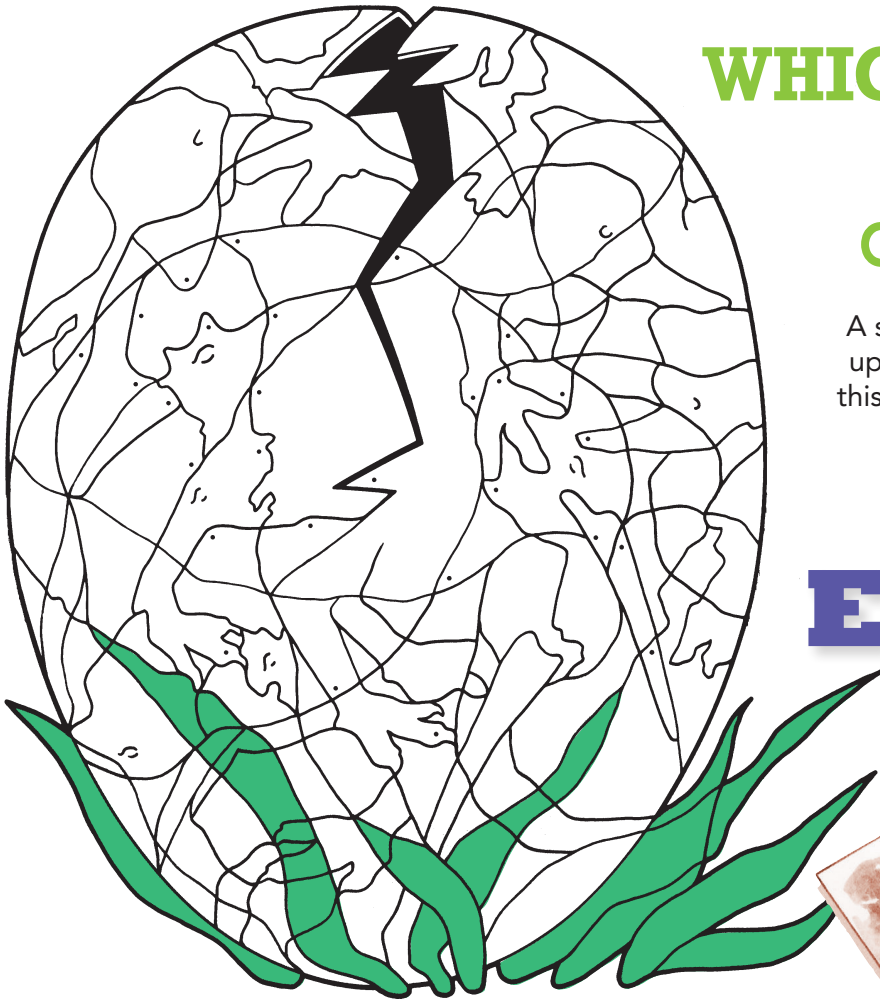

Egg Paint

Have you ever used an egg to paint a picture? For many centuries, this is just what many artists did. They called their egg paint tempera. You can make some of this egg paint yourself to create a painting of your favorite ratite. Follow these directions:

You will need: an egg yolk, water, vinegar, small bowls or jar lids, food coloring, soft paintbrushes, and paper or white cardboard.



Break the egg into a bowl. Separate the yolk from the white. To the yolk, add a tablespoon of water and a drop of vinegar. Mix well.



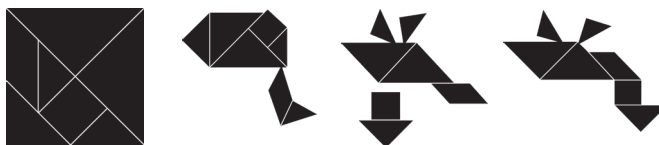
Separate the egg mixture into small bowls or jar lids. Add several drops of food coloring to each bowl to make the colors you wish to use.



Paint a picture of your favorite ratite. Perhaps you might also include several eggs in your painting. (In paintings, eggs are often included as a symbol of life.)



Clean your paintbrushes well with water.

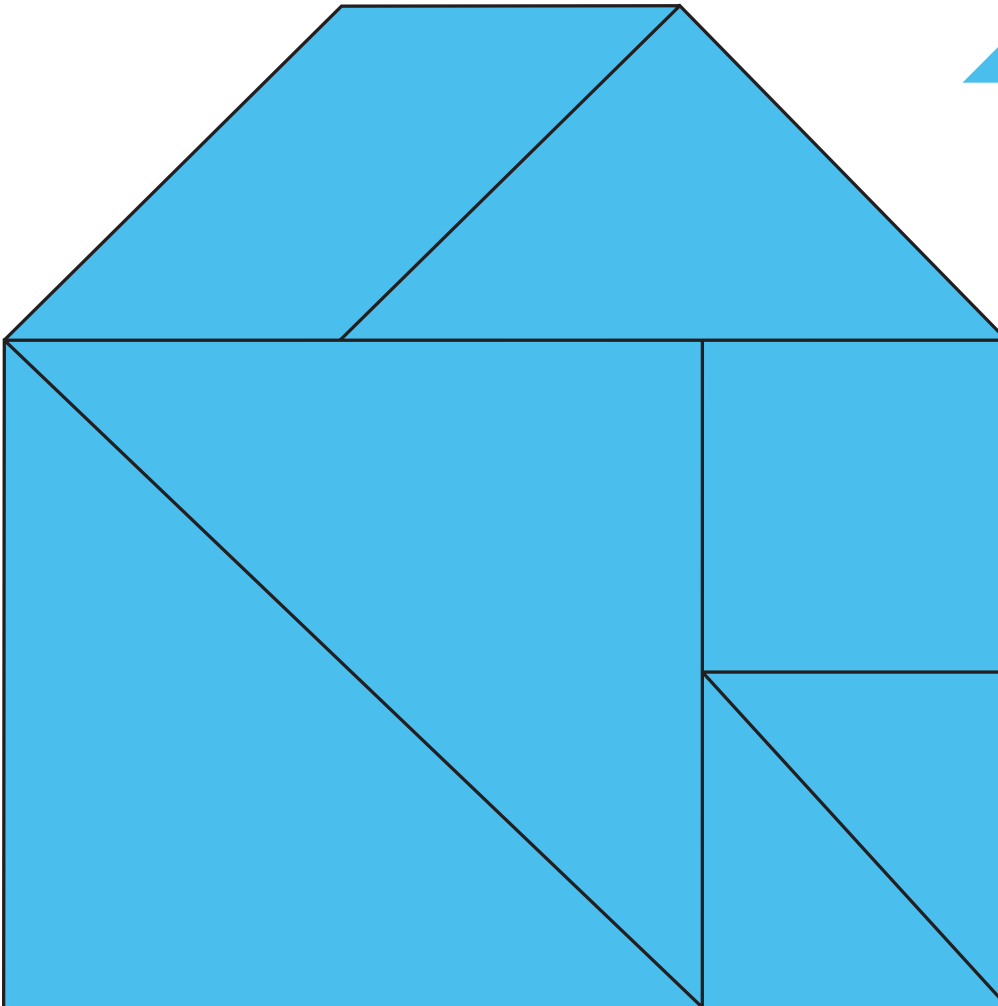
Which Came First, the Ratite or the Egg:

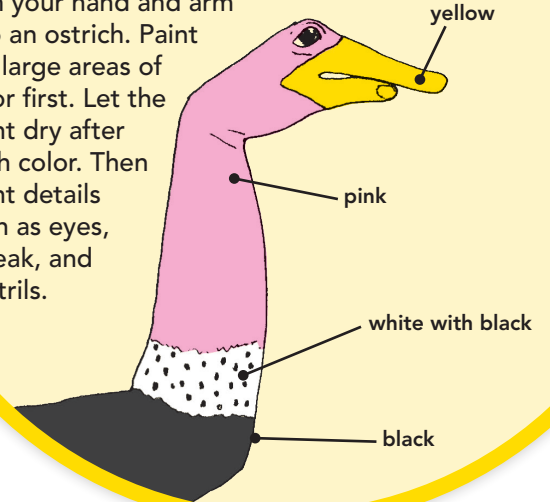
CHALLENGE

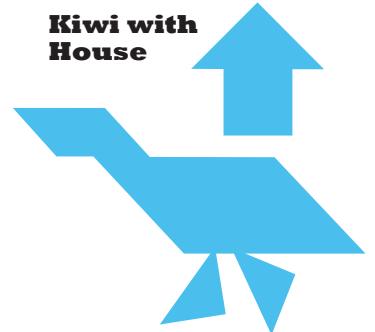


Try Your Hand at This One

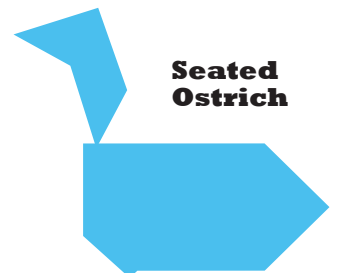
