
Make a POP-UP Card

Follow steps 1–5 to make your own.


1 Cut out the body. Add details. Glue it to the card.




Glue the spring in place.




Cut out the head.

b. Fold one strip


Fold




Picture Postcard Eye-Clue



A Shapely Animal

Are you up to the challenge of completing this two-part puzzle? In the first part, you will unscramble four words. If you do so successfully, you will be able to try your hand at the second part and make a special picture.

Your instructions, assuming you accept this challenge, are below. It's okay to get help from an adult.

Part One

Someone has taken letters away from the alphabet. Can you discover which ones? Follow these steps to do so:

- 1. Figure out which letters are missing from each strip, one strip at a time. Write each set of missing letters near the strip it's from.
- 2. Unscramble the letters to discover four color words. (*Red* is an example of a color word—but it's not in this puzzle.) Write the color word above the shape that goes with the strip. When you find all four colors, move on to Part Two of this puzzle.

Part Two

An artist used different shapes to create a picture of a special animal. That animal is hiding in the picture below. Follow these steps to reveal the animal:

- 1. Color the 3-sided shapes of the puzzle the color described by the word you unscrambled from the missing letters in the top strip.
- **2.** Color the 4-sided shapes the color that matches the unscrambled word from the right strip.
- **3.** Color the 5-sided shapes the color from the bottom strip.
- **1.** Color the 6-sided shapes the color from the left strip.



Answers: Color 3-sided shapes orange; 4-sided shapes black; 5-sided shapes brown; and 6-sided shapes blue to create a drawing of a charging elephant.
