No. Many hummingbirds are drab and dull. Females are often just a subdued brown or gray. Even those hummingbirds that flash the most color have no actual color on their feathers. The color you see is refracted light from the structure of the feathers. It's like the colors that flash when light hits a clear prism, or the rainbow colors you see when the sun sparkles on water from the lawn sprinkler. Highly colorful hummingbirds will even look dull if the light doesn't hit them right.

Will a hummingbird attack me?

A hummingbird will defend its territory from intruders and its feeder from rivals. It will also scare intruders away from its nest. If a hummingbird hovers too near you and jabs at you, it's probably saying, "Give me some space!" Often they come near you to take some fuzz from a sweater or a loose hair to weave into a nest. If a hummingbird is used to you and knows that you fill the feeder, it may light on your shoulder or your hand.


Answers

Seeing Like an Artist

You can look at a hummingbird the way an artist might. Look at the textures and colors that appear on the hummingbirds in this issue of *Ranger Rick Zoobooks®*. You can use what you learn to finish the illustration of a hummingbird on this page.

When selecting the textures that you will use, study the chart in this box. You can use similar textures on groups of feathers. For example, you might use the same type of texture on all the wing feathers. You might use two or three types of textures on the feathers that cover the body of the bird. Create your selected textures with pencil on the illustration.

When choosing the colors that you will use, you might consider using colors from the same family. A sample of color families appears below. Then, use light tints and dark shades of your selected colors to add interest to your drawing. Use crayon, felt pens, or watercolor paints.



Get Your FINGERS on These BIRDS

You can make hummingbird finger puppets. First, color the puppets. Look through this issue of *Ranger Rick Zoobooks®* for ideas on how to color the birds.
